## Program



Rob Emanuel presented a program on turning wooden pens. There are a lot of new kits and materials on the market now and the pens make excellent gifts for special occasions.

The kits come with instructions and all the metal parts needed to make a pen. The pen barrels can be made with any imaginable material from wood, to animal antlers and plastic. The object is to turn the pen barrels on a lathe to a distinctive shape or use a special material to make a unique pen.

Some basics instructions include selecting the pen type and barrel material and match them

to the proper size mandrel and bushings. Drill the proper size hole in the pen blank and glue the brass barrel into the blank with 2-part epoxy or cyanoacrylate (instant glue). It's best to scuff the brass barrels with fine sandpaper to help the glue bond to the metal. After the glue dries, it's very important that you square the ends of the blanks to the barrels.

Then, put the barrels on the mandrel with the proper size bushings on either side of the blanks and turn the material with your favorite turning tool to the proper diameter. Sand the turned barrel and apply the finish that's appropriate for that material.

After the barrels are complete, assemble the pen according to the instructions supplied with the kit. You can use a special pressing device or a 'squeeze clamp' to press the metal parts into the barrels. Be careful that the point of the refill protrudes the right distance out of the bottom barrel point.
