during the meeting. Dean Partridge was the lucky winner.

Tool Reviews



Dean Partridge showed us his new Dowel and Tenon Cutting tool that makes 1/2" dowels from 5/8" square stock.

The kit comes with a 5/8" square drive socket and drive adapter for an electric drill. The cutter has an adjustable, curved blade that will allow some size adjustment of the finished dowel. A straight blade is also available to cut tapered tenons used in chair making. Dean suggests that you sharpen the blade before using the tool - it's really not sharp enough right out of the box. David Rutledge brought a center-finding ruler made by General Tools. The ruler has dual scales, normal graduations on the top

David Rutledge brought a center-finding

scale and half graduations on the bottom scale. To find the center of a board, measure it with the top scale, then find the identical measurement on the bottom scale and you've located the center - no math required!



David also brought an adjustable edge-marking gauge that doubles as a small T-square. It has very fine marking measurements - 1/64" horizontally and 1/28th vertically. It has very tiny holes so you can make accurate markings - but you have to use a very pencil.

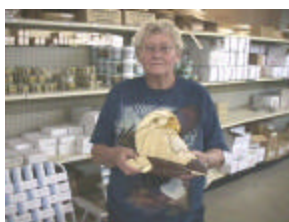
Show & Tells

Howard Hartman brought the jig he made to sharpen his chisels and plane irons. He used a double layer of plywood and a sheet of plate glass. He tapes his abrasive to the glass and uses a holder to keep the edge straight while he's sharpening.

Program



Rob Emanuel presented our program this month and it featured his Inkra Jig LS-25 precision positioning fence. Rob

purchased it about 4 years ago and recently started using it.



The kit comes with the fence, the precision lead-screw positioning head, templates and a very extensive

instruction manual. The LS-25 has a 25" positioning head. Inkra also makes a 17" version. The templates are designed to use certain size bits, so it's best to purchase a router bit set specifically designed for use with the Inkra Jig.

Operation is simple! Just pick the type joint/cut you want to make, install the proper bit in your router and make the cuts according to the directions in the manual.

Using a box joint as an example, pick the template for the width joint you want, say 3/8", and install the 3/8" straight bit in your router. Set the bit height a few thousandths of an inch higher than your stock is thick.



Setup the 'center cut' as directed in the manual. That's where the Inkra shines, you can set the distance from the bit exactly where needs to be with the precision

lead-screw adjustment.

Stack your opposing sides together and clamp one set to the sled. If you want a good fit, you have to clamp the stock to the sled. Cut all of the 'A' cuts at one time, then cut all of the 'B' cuts.

The Inkra Jig easily cuts dovetails of almost any size or spacing. You can even cut the famous 'shadow' dovetails that use contrasting woods to highlight the dovetail joint.

The Inkra Jig also works very well as a table saw fence.
